BRICK WALL

I need help in locating an 1860 & 1870 census record for Elie (Alea) Pierre Pitre b.08/26/1841 Lafourche parish; d. 09/19/1989 Terrebonne Parish south of Montegut. Please keep in mind possible misspellings First name Elie or Alea and Last name Pitre or Pete. I have not found any record of my great great grandfather in the 1860 in Louisiana. Stories handed down by my great aunt (now deceased) state that at one point Elie Pitre lived in the area of Grand Chenier, a high ridge along the gulf coast lined with oak trees. It was the last land mast just before Grand Island. I did find reference to Elie Pierre Pitre's farther in the 1860 census living in Jefferson City (annexed by New Orleans in 1870)

I think based on my research it is plausible that Elie (Alea) Pitre lived in somewhere along the remote costal area during that time and the census takers missed a lot of people. That was during the great yellow fever quarantines and

many of the small settlements along the coastal area were remote and very hard to get to. Yellow fever quarantines New Orleans area 1853, 1854, 1855, 1858, 1867.

Any help would be greatly appreciated.
